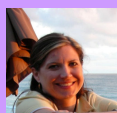
#### **Forrest Crawford, Professor, Teacher Education and Assistant to President for Diversity**

Dr. Crawford assisted with WSU's annual Fall Diversity Conference - the theme for the 10th anniversary program was "Diversity and Music." Traditionally WSU reaches out not only across campus, but also in the local community. Some of the projects included: support for the Annual Multicultural Youth Conference, Cinco de Mayo community celebration, Martin Luther King Jr. Day commemoration support for the Annual Holocaust commemoration, Women's History Month activities, etc. Dr. Crawford attended the presidential inaugural activities, hosted the art exhibition "March for Dignity" and the Diversity Appreciation luncheon. He also received awards this spring, including: (1) Caesar Chavez Peace and Justice Award from Utah Coalition for La Raza, and (2) the Pete Suazo Lifetime Achievement Award for Social Justice from the University of Utah Graduate School of Social Work. Most recently, Dr. Crawford was elected as Secretary General to the International Society for Teacher Education, a group that will convene at WSU June 3-9, 2009.

## Women's Studies Scholarships

### Phoenix Achievement Scholarship

The Phoenix Achievement Scholarship was established by a private donor to support students minoring in the Women's Studies program at Weber State University and enhance the education of women's issues generally across campus.

The scholarship will be awarded annually (as funds are available) to one or more students who participate in the Women's Studies Program. The scholarship can be used to fund tuition, fees, and/or books for the qualified student(s). Preference will go to non-traditional women students (defined as 25 years of age or older). ***If there is not a non-traditional woman student who meets the following criteria, the scholarship can then be awarded to a traditional woman student(s) who participates in the Women's Studies Program.***

#### Criteria:

1. Undergraduate enrolled as a full-time student (12 hours or more) leading to a degree.
2. Have a cumulative grade point average of 3.0 or above and be making satisfactory progress toward a degree.

### Traditional Scholarship Award (Textbook Scholarship)

#### Criteria:

1. Male or Female 26 years of age or younger
2. Declared Women's Studies minor
3. Willing to become active in the program

Please pick-up applications for these scholarships in the Women's Studies Office, SS303, in the Social Science Building. The due date for the application is February 1 of every year. 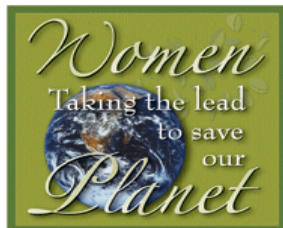




#### 25 FAST FACTS ABOUT WOMEN AROUND THE WORLD:

1. 80% of the 50 million people around the world who are affected by violent conflicts, civil wars, disasters, and displacement are women and children.
2. In 2004, 48.8% of the seats held in parliament in Rwanda were held by women. Contrast that to Cuba where 36% of the seats were held by women, and the USA, where 14.3 % of the seats were held by women. Saudi Arabia and the Solomon Islands are just two countries where there are no women in parliament (*UNDP, Human Development Report 2004*)
3. In 76 countries, less than half the eligible girls are enrolled in secondary school
4. Women own only 1% of the world's land
5. Approximately three million women in the USA sport tattoos
6. A Saudi Arabian woman can get a divorce if her husband doesn't give her coffee
7. 43% of Australian marriages end in divorce. Of those who remarry, 65% of them will divorce again. By the time you try for marriage number 3, your chance of getting divorced is about 75%.
8. The women of the Tiwi tribe in the South Pacific are married at birth.
9. It is illegal to be a prostitute in Siena, Italy, if your name is Mary.
10. In parts of Malaya, the women keep harems of men.
11. The two highest IQ's ever recorded (on a standard test) both belong to women.
12. In Kenya where 38% of the farms are run by women, those women manage to harvest the same amount per hectare (2.47 acres) as men, despite men having greater access to loans, advice, fertilizers, hybrid seeds, insecticides. And when women were given the same level of help, they were found to be more efficient than men, and produced bigger harvests.

## Women's History Month in Review



A number of activities were held during Women's History Month 2009. Women's Studies supported and advertised in support of other activities across campus during Women's History Month. Several events were directly sponsored by Women's Studies including:

(1) **International Women's Day Panel.** In celebration of International Women's Day, Priti Kumar spoke on the grass roots women's movement in India to save trees and the environment; Judith Pratt spoke on international women's health issues in Russia and Wangari wa Nyatetu-Waiggwa spoke on Wangari Maathai (Nobel Peace Prize winner from Kenya). The event was well attended by approximately 35 students and faculty.

(2) **Female Athlete Celebration.** This event included approximately 40 Jr. High School female athletes who were given free admission to watch the WSU Women's Basketball game vs. Idaho State University followed by a post-game "meet and greet" with WSU players. The Jr. High School students had a great experience and were able to be introduced to the Women's Studies Program at WSU as well as the athletic department.

(3) **Poetry Reading.** Dr. Alicia Giralt read poetry selections of their choice in their own native language followed by English. A discussion led by Maria Parrilla de Kokal followed. This event was well attended with approximately 15 students and faculty.

(4) **Speaker: Debra Humphreys.** Women's Studies brought in Debra Humphreys, the current Vice President for Communications and Public Affairs at the Association of American Colleges and Universities. Dr. Humphreys lectured at the Davis and Ogden Campuses of Weber State University. She focused on Women in Higher Education. The Davis session was attended by approximately 20 students, faculty and staff. The Ogden session was well attended by approximately 45 students, faculty, staff and community members.

(5) **Film Series.** A film series focused on environmental issues was featured the week of March 23 and included the following films: "Sustainable Environments," and "Jane Goodall: reason for hope: a spiritual journey." Sustainable Environments had a low turnout; however, the Jane Goodall film was well attended with approximately 14 students, faculty, staff and community members and was very much suited for our Women's History Month theme.

(6) **Environmental Panel.** In recognition of the theme of Women's History Month: "Women Taking the Lead to Save our Planet," Women's Studies organized an environmental panel featuring specialists in the environmental field, including: Crystal Carpenter, Antelope Island State Park; Joan Degiorgio, Nature Conservancy; Courtney Henley, MD, a founding member of two local grassroots clean air advocacy organizations -- Utah Moms for Clean Air and Utah Physicians for a Healthy Environment; and Rane Johnson, Sierra Club. The event was well attended by approximately 35 students, faculty, staff and community members.

13. Over half a million women die in childbirth every year in Africa and Asia.

14. Nearly 1/2 of all Indonesian women have had their first child by the time they are 17.

15. In the USA, unintended pregnancies account for almost half of all pregnancies.

16. According to *The World Health Org.*, 40 per cent of girls aged 17 or under in South Africa are reported to have been the victim of rape or attempted rape.

17. In Sweden, 76% of mothers work, the highest percentage in the developed world.

18. Australia, New Zealand and the US are among a handful of governments that do not require women to be paid some form of maternity leave. In countries as diverse as Russia, Colombia, Laos and Morocco, the government foots the entire bill for three to six months of maternity leave.

19. By age 55, 95% of all U.S. women have married.

20. In 2007 the world's richest self-made woman was Ms Zhang Yin, a Chinese paper recycling entrepreneur.

21. Only 5% of Hollywood feature films are directed by women.

22. Today, Japan leads the world in condom use. Like cosmetics, they're sold door to door, by women.

23. Seventy percent of women would rather have chocolate than sex (*Poll taken in a 1995 women's magazine*).

24. Australian women have sex on the first date more than women the same age in the USA and Canada.

25. China is considered the next big marketing opportunity for the tobacco industry because only 3.8% of Chinese women smoke, compared with 63 % of adult males.
